1. Ace Amundson



Hi, my name is Ace Amundson. I decided to sign to introduce myself and then I stopped before I frustrated too many people. But my life is frustrating every day more from Ableism than my disorders. I am not Deaf. I am hard of hearing, as in without my hearing aides, I can't hear my own voice. Can't lipread with all the masks and I have autism and PTSD. Also, anxiety and depression get in my way in socializing. I have physical disabilities so accessible issues arise.

I have central auditory processing disorder as my hearing is incorrect as I can't sort sounds my hearing aides Amplify everything equally. I don't use the resources of the Deaf as interrupting isn't needed if I can lip read. Deaf people do not consider being Deaf a disability but a Culture and a language. I am not Deaf and not totally hearing. As an Autistic person I disassociate form reality but not as in hallucinations. It

is my PTSD that can happen if I am triggered.

I hope to bring a chance to increase sensitivity training to include Ableism. When I was homeless, I was a youth and an adult. As a gender fluid lesbian in the 70s and 80s here in Edmonton, Calgary and Vancouver, I struggled with mental health issues and addiction and I was homeless, I was abused by the police and yet in other cases they helped me. I am an addict clean for 18years. I am transgender, hard of hearing, neuro diverse with a degree from the university of life. A Diploma from Mount Royal University in Rehabilitation Services, and a Certificate in American Sign Language and Deaf Cultural Studies from Lakeland College. I am fluent in sign language but semi illiterate in reading as I am dyslexic. I may be different and my past is painful but I hope I can be of help. I have worked in the field of humanities when I was over 30 years old but for years but prior to that. I was homeless and involved in crime prior to finding my way off the streets in my late twenties. I found help. Warning I am a blunt person and may offend without intention. This is due to my autism and head injuries. I will use trigger warnings prior to talking and listen and learn from all of you. I may not understand your words neurologically or your meaning but I am a Disabled person with a chance to help the police in their approach to people like myself.

My experience my help to see the Ableism and able bodied Privilege in society and how it wears away at the soul of a person. Who is struggling with, mental health, transgender, a recovered addict, who is a neurologically diverse and physically disabled person, dealing with chronic pain. I am a cancer survivor and I am here to fight Ableism. I am here to help.

Clay Hitchcock (they/them, he/him) was born and raised in small town central Alberta. Coming from rural roots and coming out early in life, they learned from doing how to navigate their privilege and marginalization. After moving to Edmonton in 2011 it took a couple years for them to fall in love with the city but now they'd never leave. A life-long volunteer, Clay has found joy and learning in volunteering with queer organizations throughout the city such as HIV Edmonton, Edmonton Pride Festival Society, and Edmonton Men's Health Collective. Their passion for people and stories has recently led them back to school to study Human Resources and Labour Relations with a focus on how people living with marginalization navigate the workforce and ways to enhance their representation and wellbeing. Clay hopes that their voice on the SOGIE committee will be one that amplifies those who are not or cannot sit at the

table and holds EPS as an organization to account for the promises it has made to the queer community.

Corey has been working with Queer youth for over 25 years. He currently is a youth outreach worker for the C.H.E.W. He has sat on a number of non-profit boards and was vice-chair of the board for Homeward Trust Edmonton. In his spare time, he manages a recreational dragon boat team.
